CALL TO ORDER

Chief Tucker called the meeting to order, welcomed attendees.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion by Mr. McLaughlin to approve minutes of the May 20, 2026, Committee meeting, second by Mr. Carey. Unanimous approval.

DISCUSSION

Presentation by Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAAS), Nick Galvin, Program Manager:

- “5121-Youth & Young Adult Medicaid Reentry Benefit Overview” is a new federal requirement to provide certain medical and behavioral health screenings, diagnostic services, and case management services for Medicaid eligible juvenile youth (post-adjudication, post-sentencing) in public institutions pre-release and immediately post-release.
- Applies to local and regional jails.
- Phase 1, July 2026: Program begins with individuals releasing from DOC custody. Most individuals released will be 18+.
- Phase 2, Spring 2027: Program expands to include individuals releasing from DJJ custody.
- Phase 3, Late 2027/Early 2028: Program expands to include individuals releasing from local and regional jails.

INMATE ACCESS TO COUNSEL/HB 126 & 6VAC15-40-680

Mr. Flaherty shared the Board is required to have regulations completed by January 1, 2027, and those regulations must adhere to the APA 2.2-4000. Collaboration included the patron, VSA, VARJ, and the Indigent Defense Commission. This draft is an attempt to find common ground and feasibility while conforming with law.

ANNUAL CAPACITY REPORT

- a. Mandate: Item 385 D., 2026-2028 Biennial Budget
- b. Survey distributed June 30, 2026

- c. Due July 31, 2026

REPORTING REQUIREMENT. PREGNANT AND POSTPARTUM RESTRAINTS (HB861)

- a. Requires facility provide BLRJ quarterly summary of written reports of restraints of inmates known to be pregnant and restraints of prisoners during postpartum recovery.
- b. Requires specific information submitted to the State Compensation Board quarterly through the Local Inmate Data System (LIDS).
- c. Incorporated into Q3 CQI reporting.

EXPANDED POLYSTYRENE (EPS) BAN

Effective July 1, 2026, Expanded Polystyrene (EPS), known as Styrofoam, is banned from food service. This is a result of a phased-in initiative by the 2021 General Assembly and is in full effect this year. The Code of Virginia includes in the definition of a “food vendor:” “. . .any other person who provides prepared food; and any individual, organization, group, or state or local government entity that regularly provides food as a part of its services.” Jails are encouraged to implement suggested options available from the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ): DEQ Foam-Free Resources. <https://www.deq.virginia.gov/land-waste/waste-management/litter-prevention/foam-free-resources>

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

Mr. Hackworth shared Colonel Smith's retirement from Western Tidewater Regional Jail.

Mr. Hackworth reported ongoing statewide conversations regarding forensic patients undergoing competency and the challenges provided by the many moving pieces of the process. He shared ongoing successful collaboration with the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security. Mr. Hackworth emphasized the importance of CQI reports.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion to adjourn by Captain Carey, second by Mr. Hackworth. Unanimous approval.

6VAC15-40-680. Visitation

Visitation policies and procedures shall be posted publicly and include:

- A. Maximum visiting opportunities are limited only by safety, personnel constraints, inmate disciplinary status, and technical difficulties associated with non-contact virtual visits.
- B. Procedures for visitation eligibility, approval process, scheduling (including some evenings and weekend days), screening and searches, alternative visitation methods, denials, restrictions, and process for making formal complaints.
- C. Specific requirements for visitor registration, identification, and appropriate attire.
- D. List of approved items that visitors may bring into the facility. Items brought into the facility by visitors for inmates shall be subject to inspections and approval.

New Regulation (required by law)

6VAC15-40-685 Legal Visits

Legal visit policies and procedures shall be posted publicly and include:

- A. Attorneys and legal representatives of law firms with a current attorney-client relationship with the inmate may be afforded maximum visiting opportunities that are limited only by safety, personnel constraints, and technical difficulties associated with non-contact virtual visits.
- B. Procedures for visitation eligibility, approval process, scheduling (including some nights and weekends), screening and searches, alternative visitation methods, denials, restrictions, and process for making formal complaints.
- C. Specific requirements for visitor registration, identification, and appropriate attire.
- D. List of approved items that visitors may bring into the facility. Items brought into the facility by visitors for inmates shall be subject to inspections and approval.
- E. Attorneys shall be permitted to have confidential and secure legal counsel visits inside the facility, by telephone, or by video conference with their clients. Conditions for inmate visits with an attorney or a legal representative must maintain the confidentiality of the attorney-client conversations, not be recorded, or monitored all while ensuring proper security and sight supervision.
- F. Any denial or postponement of legal visit by the facility shall be supported by rationale and counsel be promptly notified. The rationale shall be approved by the agency administrator or designee and, upon request, provided in writing to the attorney or legal staff whose visit was denied or postponed.

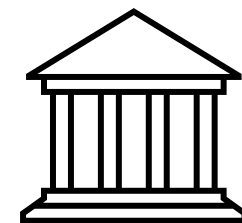

Overview of CAA Section 5121 Benefit

New requirement for states to provide certain medical and behavioral health **screenings, diagnostic services, and case management services** for Medicaid eligible juvenile youth (**post-adjudication, post-sentencing**) in public institutions pre-release and immediately post-release.

Populations eligible:

- Medicaid eligible children/youth under 21 years old
 - Youth between ages 18 and 26 eligible for Medicaid as a former foster care youth
 - Targeted low-income children/youth, i.e., CHIP (FAMIS)
-
- Includes **DOC, DJJ facilities and local and regional jails**
 - Effective date: **July 1, 2026 (DOC only)**



Youth Reentry Program Implementation: Phased Approach

A phased approach to build strong partnerships and ensure a successful launch across Virginia.



ELIGIBILITY: AGE DOES NOT CHANGE

The Youth Reentry Program eligibility remains the same throughout all phases:

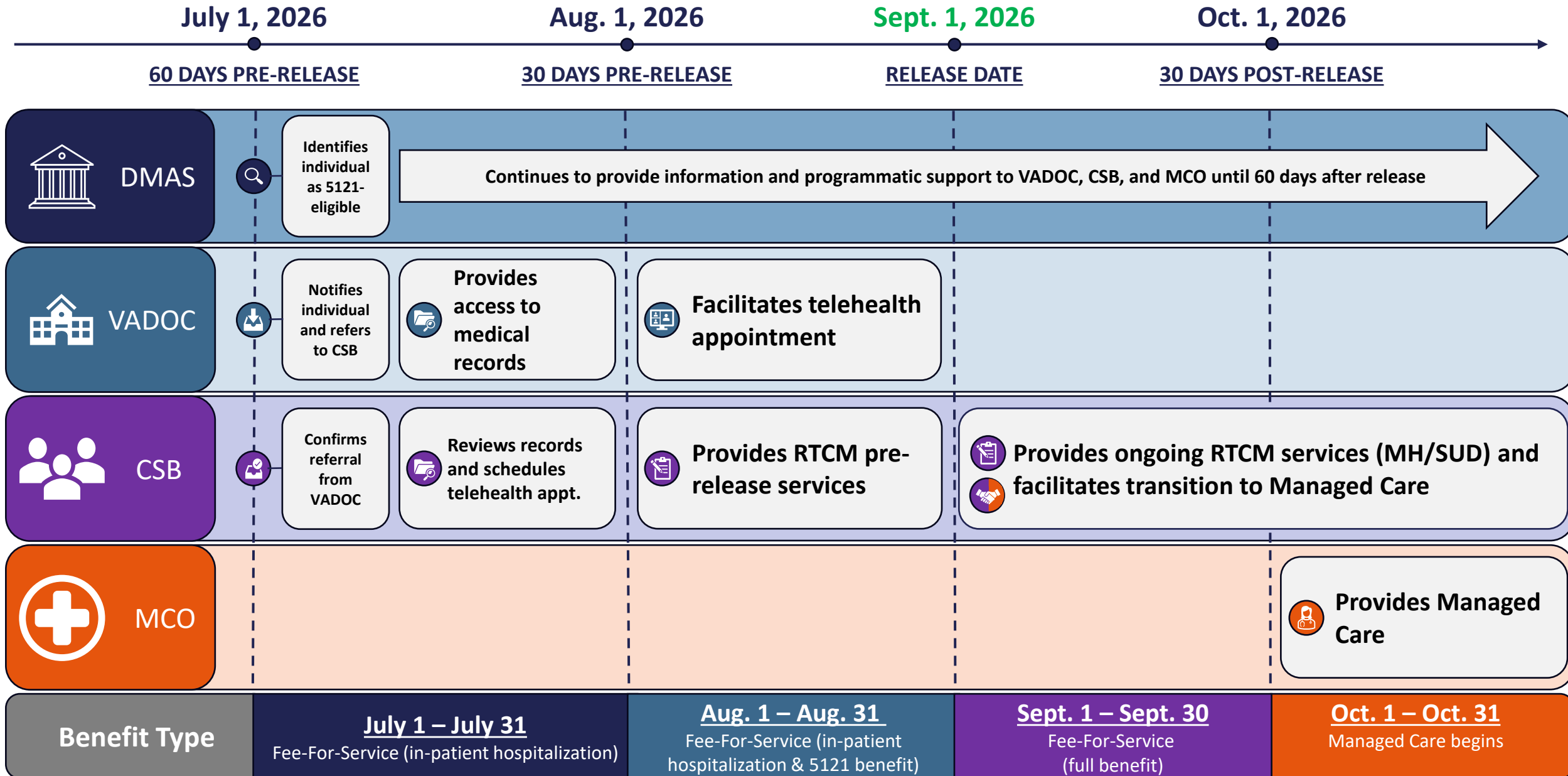
- ✓ Under the age of **21**
- ✓ Under the age of **26** if they are former **Foster Care**



The majority of individuals released from DOC custody will be **18+**.

Note: Program eligibility (ages) remains the same throughout all phases of implementation.

5121 Youth Reentry Workflow – Example Release Date: September 1, 2026



Re-Entry Targeted Case Management (RTCM)

RTCM services will be provided to eligible individuals by local Community Services Boards (CSBs) and will be carved out of managed care and billed through Fee-For-Service.

RTCM includes the following core activities:

- **Re-Entry Needs Assessment:** Conducted pre-release when feasible (or as soon as possible post release); includes review of carceral records, screenings, services, medications, and identified gaps.
- **Person-Centered Individual Service Plan (ISP):** Developed collaboratively with the individual and family/caregiver; completed within 14 days of assessment and reviewed at least every 30 days.
- **Referrals & Care Coordination:** Scheduling and linking to medical, behavioral health, social, educational, and community services; ensuring continuity of prescribed medications and connection to a primary care provider.
- **Monitoring & Follow-Up:** Ongoing review of ISP effectiveness, service delivery, and changing needs.
- **Transition Coordination:** A required meeting with the Managed Care Organization (MCO) care coordinator or designee to ensure continuity of care and understanding of ongoing care coordination supports.
